

The Gospel of Mark

Group Guide: Week 13, Mark 6:53-7:23

INTRODUCTION

As the Gospel of Mark continues, Jesus is confronted by the Pharisees once again. The last time the Pharisees and Jesus met, it ended with a conspiracy to kill Jesus and attributing Jesus' works to Satan. In Mark chapter 7, Jesus condemns the Pharisees' hypocrisy in following their own religious traditions but ignoring the loving commands of God. Jesus ends his teaching by listing what really defiles a person: their own hearts with evil desires. Jesus' teaching points to the reality that everyone has evil desires and falls short of the glory of God. By the time we get to the end of the passage, Mark has shown us that mankind's only hope to cleanse the deepest of inward stains is for Jesus to fulfill his mission.

Ask two group members to read Mark 6:53-7:23

SUMMARIZE

Ask two group members who didn't summarize last week to summarize the passage this week.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Share with the group any traditions you had growing up. Have you ever gotten into trouble or been looked down upon because you did something outside of a tradition? Share your experience.
- 2. As a group think through different, present day "external" religious practices that Jesus may consider "teaching as doctrines the commandments of men". Share what your experience with those practices has been.
- 3. Reread what Jesus said to the Pharisees in 7:6-7. Confess times in your life where you are tempted to honor the Lord with your lips but your heart is far

4. In verses 9-13 Jesus describes a way that the Pharisees use their religious practices for their own selfish gain. He finishes by saying "and many such things you do." In what ways do you use religious practice primarily for selfish gain? What do you gain from your practice?
5. Reread verses 14-23. The Pharisees of Jesus' day were more concerned about being defiled from things outside themselves than from their own sinful hearts. In what ways do you tend to view or blame the circumstances around you as the cause of your own sin?
6. Verses 20-23 set up a bleak picture of all people's ability to be clean on their own. Jesus seems to be pointing forward to the reality that all who desire to be clean must be cleansed by someone outside themselves, namely Jesus Christ. How does the fact that you can't clean yourself make you feel? How does it shape the way you view your life? Share with the group.
ADVENT READING WEEK 1 (Isaiah 9:1-7)
9 But there will be no gloom for her who was in anguish. In the former time he brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he has made glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations.
